# A WORD FROM THE PASTOR

# Salty Salt

"You are the salt of the earth," Jesus said to His gathered followers. This phrase has gained enough popularity to be well-known outside of Church, and to be applied to people with no religious connotation at all. The internet translates the phrase to mean a decent or noteworthy person. It is also the title to books, movies, and a Rolling Stones

song. Dictionary.Com defines it as "an individual or group considered as representative of the best or noblest elements of society." It seems to me I've heard it used to describe wholesome, down-to-earth kind of people.

I don't think any of these definitions catch the meaning Jesus intended. I suppose it's just possible that Jesus looked out at the crowd – this is part of the Sermon on the Mount – and thought, "My, these are good, decent, noble-hearted people." Maybe He just said this to commend them for being such fine, upstanding folks. But I don't think so. Because He goes on to warn them to do well. They have potential, but potential can be wasted.

The normal understanding of the 'salt of the earth' is good people. People who do good, who are liked and respected. People who contribute. Every word of that is right, I think, as far as it goes. But if all they do is be good, if all they do is make things better, then they are doing nothing more than being good for goodness' sake; if it's not too far after Christmas to use that phrase. Salt being good for goodness' sake is good enough if we're talking about seasoning meat, but Jesus clearly had more

than meat in mind.

The Sermon on the Mount opens with these words: "When Jesus saw the crowds, He went up on the mountain; and after He sat down, His disciples came to Him. He opened His mouth and began to teach them." A question we need to answer is who is the 'them' He taught? The crowd, or the disciples? Normal rules of grammar would say it refers to the most

mar would say it refers to the most recent subject. So He taught the disciples, with the crowd present. If this is the case, the disciples are the salt, and the crowds are what is to be salted.

To be clear, the salt is good deeds, but they are good deeds done in Jesus' name. As He says a little later, when speaking of light, "Let your light shine before men in such a way that they may see your good works and glorify your Father who is in heaven." Being salty is doing good works to glorify God. Our 'saltiness' is to point people to Him.

Normally, salt doesn't need a pep talk. I haven't yet witnessed a cook explaining to his seasoning what it is to do. "Ok Salt, you are the salt of this meal. I need you to be good and salty. If you lose your saltiness, there's no getting it back." Salt doesn't need a pep talk. But we are salt with a will. And the unfortunate baggage that comes with a will is a won't. Salt with a will must be reminded to be salty.

So if we are Jesus' disciples, and we want to do His will, how do we go about being salt? Salty salt? There are probably several answers to that question, but three come to mind quickly: Salt must be in close proximity with what is salted, salt is absorbed in what is salted, and salt is not an individual effort.

The proximity issue says that if we will be salt, we will make a difference where we are. This does not mean we can't make impact from a distance, too. Jesus followed this salt metaphor with a light metaphor. Light shines in the distance. But this is the salt metaphor. Salt doesn't make an impact at distance. It must be up close and personal.

Salt must be on the meat, or the veggies, or whatever. It only flavors what it comes into contact with. Or, for those of us who remember using rock salt as ice melt, it only melts the ice it comes into contact with. If we are the salt and this world is the meat, we must make contact with the world if we want to make it better. If all we do is occasionally congregate in a salt shaker and sing about our saltiness we are no good for anything, except to be thrown out and trampled under foot by men.

Salt is absorbed in what is salted. Sometimes, if I've been sweating a lot and feel a cramp coming on, I might throw some plain salt down my throat. As a rule, though, we don't especially enjoy plain salt. Something that is properly salted tastes good, but not salty. Or at least not too salty. Once, when making my chili, I oversalted it. At Joan's advice, I threw a potato in the pot. The potato absorbed the excess salt, and not only did the chili taste good, the potato did, too!

We need to be involved in the world. Christianity

does not get to be a 'good people' club where we complain about the world but don't do anything to make it better. And we don't make it better merely by voting or supporting missions or praying. Those are good; but they are distance things. Salt is up close. So we do things to make a difference. We become part of the world we're trying to improve; and know we won't make it better until we do. So we sit on the school board, or volunteer at the food bank, or shovel someone's sidewalk, or go to jail (in a positive way). We go into the world, so we can make a difference in the world.

Salt is not an individual effort. One grain of salt will not make a better burger. Several grains of salt will. We are only responsible for ourselves, but God didn't place us here to be alone or to function alone. We will make the most difference when we work as a group, in fellowship with other believers.

Observation: you don't get to choose whether you will be salt. Jesus said, "You are the salt of the world." But you get to choose whether to get out of the shaker. You get to choose whether you will be salty. Make a difference in this world. Be salty salt.

# **Heart Talk**

"As a man thinks in his heart, so is he" (Proverbs 23:7 KJV).

I am a heart patient – and a cancer patient. But that is not what ought to define me.

As I've been recovering from both of my health issues over the past four months, I've

had a few bouts with anxiety that may have produced symptoms that prompted me to seek medical attention. At the last, my doctors have concluded that my body is in good shape, but my mind is "over-thinking" things!

"As a man thinks in his heart (mind), so is he!"

So, I'm working on my mind. Instead of considering myself primarily a "patient," I'm thinking of myself as a guy who happens to have a couple of health issues that I need to keep track of and continue to make the lifestyle adjustments to keep them in check, as best as I can.

It's also true that I am "a sinner, saved by grace." But as I read the New Testament letters, I've become convinced that this designation isn't the defining one. Just as my body carries the remnants of disease, so my soul has a struggle with sin. But Christ has dealt with that sin and will eventually remove all of its traces from my life, just as all traces of physical disease will disappear entirely in our resurrection bodies!

For the Christian, "sinner" is no longer the defining term. Rather, we are "saints." We are "in Christ." We are "God's children" and His "servants" and "ambassadors."

It might seem to be simple semantics, but "as a man thinks in his heart, so is he." How and what I think about myself is cru-

cial. If I regard myself as primarily a "sinner," then I'm prone to sin. But if I think of myself as primarily a "saint" and "God's child," I will (supernaturally, by the power of the Holy Spirit) conform my will to His and begin to act the part.

In the early weeks of my recovery, I saw myself as a medical patient – and my thoughts and emotions followed suit. The medical community emphasized paying attention to how I felt and to seek attention if symptoms matched issues of the heart. I found myself anxious and, at times, worried, but when I saw the doctors, it was my mind, not my physical heart, that was at fault. As my mind began to realize I was doing fine, the constant focus on my body began to fade.

"As a man thinks in his heart (mind), so is he!"

When I was a boy, my dad used to tell me that "you're a Smith ... and Smiths don't do what you just did." Knowing that, within the family structure, being a "Smith" was what defined me, I gave attention to "being a Smith." I wasn't always successful (that's an understatement!), but I was seeing myself as my dad saw me.

As God's child, my heavenly Father sees me in a certain way, too. He wants the dynamic of "like Father, like son" to occur in my Christian life. He proclaims that I am a "new creation; the old has gone, the new has come" (2 Corinthians 5:17). I'm no longer defined as a "sinner," but as a "saint" (someone set apart unto the Lord) who occasionally struggles with what's left of sin in my life.

With that defined, I'm free to live for Him as one of His own! Because, "as a man thinks in his heart, so is he!"












